Veterans' Day

Major hostilities of World War I were formally ended at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918, when the Armistice with Germany went into effect. At the urging of major U.S. veteran organizations, Armistice Day was renamed Veterans Day in 1954.

Perennial Plants – To Prune or Not to Prune

The pruning of perennials in the fall or in the spring is something that can be argued either way. Should you cut back now or wait until spring? Some people like to leave the dead perennial stalks to provide a



place to hide from the winter winds and offer seed for birds and small animals. Others prefer to cut the stalks clean to the ground for a neater look during the winter!

By now, perennials are dormant and you can prune them low to the ground. In early spring, just before they push out their new growth, it's also a good time to prune. It's up to you to do what you'd like!

The favored way to do it is what we would suggest, cut back dry stems of perennials to soil level around the time of the first frost to tidy up the garden and remove pest eggs and disease spores that may linger.

Snow is Coming
